- Today, implementing existing settlements and reaching new agreements is more important than ever given the need for water on many Indian reservations and throughout the West and the uncertainty regarding its availability due to drought, climate change, and increasing demands for this scarce resource.
- With drought, climate change, increasing populations, and other factors impacting the availability of water and increasing competition for this finite resource, the number of requests for appointment of new negotiation teams continues to grow.
- In exchange for settlement benefits, tribes can and do agree to subordinate use of their water rights so that existing water uses can continue without impairment... Moreover, settlements provide mechanisms that can protect current uses by non-Indian water rights holders.
